Book VI Study Questions *Republic*

1. Name three characteristics of the future rulers (or Philosopher-Kings) of this ideal city. What is their approach to learning (487a)? What do they think of money? What kind of soul do they possess (486b)?

- 2. Briefly describe Socrates' analogy between the city and a ship (488a-489c). Why do you think he chose a ship for this analogy? What types of problems arise on this ship? How does Socrates propose that these problems could be eliminated?
- 3. What does Socrates think qualifies the future rulers (or Philosopher-Kings) to rule this ideal city?

4. What do you think Socrates *means* when he says that "Neither city nor regime will ever become perfect, nor yet will a man become perfect in the same way either, before some necessity chances to constrain those few philosophers who aren't vicious, those now called useless, to take charge of a city, whether they want to or not, and the city to obey or a true erotic passion for true philosophy flows from some divine inspiration into the sons of those who hold power or the office of king, or into the fathers themselves." (499b-499c) Moreover, why were philosophers called "useless" by many members of the city?

5. Briefly sketch the Divided Line and explain the different levels of knowledge (507a-511e).

6. How do you think the Divided Line relates to the Allegory of the Cave that Plato describes at the beginning of Book VII?
